Auckland



The 2018 New Zealand Census of Population and Dwellings was held on 6 March 2018.

This is the official count by Stats NZ of how many people and dwellings there are in New Zealand. It provides a snapshot of New Zealand on census day.

This information sheet provides an overview of initial results from the census for Auckland, and background information on the census.

Population growth

At the 2018 Census there were 1,571,718 usual residents in Auckland, an increase of 156,168 people since the 2013 Census.

This represents a 11.0% increase between 2013 and 2018. Auckland's growth is very similar to that of New Zealand (10.8% increase).

Auckland represents 33.4% of the New Zealand population, unchanged from 33.4% at the 2013 Census.





The census captures the number of occupied and unoccupied private and non-private dwellings. Non-private dwellings will not be reported here. (They provide short or long-term communal or transitory type accommodation, e.g. communal staff quarters, hospitals and prisons).

At the 2018 Census, Auckland had a total of 498,789 occupied private dwellings, an increase of 26,745, or 5.7% from 2013. This represents slower growth compared to that of New Zealand (6.6% increase).

In addition, 39,393 unoccupied private dwellings were counted.





The Western Initiative age structure

At the 2018 Census 21.2% of The Western Initiative's population was under 15, compared to 20.0% of Auckland.

10.9% were 65 or older, compared to 12.0% of Auckland.



At the 2018 Census, the approximate median age in The Western Initiative was 34.3* years, compared with 34.7 years in Auckland.


Ethnic diversity

51.4% identified as European (compared to 53.5% Auckland).

28.7% identify as Asian ethnicity (compared to 28.2% Auckland).

18.3% identify as Pacific Peoples (compared to 15.5% Auckland).

13.9% identify as Māori (compared to 11.5% Auckland). 34,785 Māori usually live in The Western Initiative area. This is an increase of 7,389 people, or 27.0%, since the 2013 Census.



MELAA refers to Middle Eastern, Latin American and African. People could choose more than one ethnicity and categories are not exclusive. Percentages will add to more than 100.

The Western Initiative had a high growth in Asian population. Since the 2013 Census this ethnic group has increased by 21,363 people, or 42.4%.
