

2018 Census results


The 2018 New Zealand Census of Population and Dwellings was held on 6 March 2018. This is the official count by Stats NZ of how many people and dwellings there are in New Zealand.

This information sheet provides an overview of initial results from the census for people in the broad European ethnic group. Ethnicity is self-perceived, and a person can be part of more than one ethnic group.

European is the slowest growing ethnic group

At the 2018 Census there were 841,383 usual residents in Auckland who identified with a European ethnicity (53.5% of Auckland's population). This is an increase of 52,092 people, or 6.6%, since the 2013 Census. The European population has grown more slowly than the wider Auckland population.

The majority of Auckland's European are NZ European

People who identify as NZ European accounted for 87.8% of the broad European ethnic group in Auckland. All other groups in this category are significantly smaller.

The largest other European groups identified as English (2.8%), South African European (2.1%), and Australian (1.0%).


Largest European ethnic groups living in Auckland

European remains Auckland's largest ethnic group

In 2018, 53.5% of the total Auckland usually resident population identified with an European ethnicity, down from 59.3% at the 2013 Census.


The European population is distributed relatively evenly over Auckland's 21 local board areas. More than 80% of the population identified with a European ethnicity in five local board areas (Aotea/Great Barrier, Waiheke, Rodney, Franklin, Hibiscus and Bays).



The maps below show the number of the usually resident population in Auckland's 21 local board areas who identify with a European ethnicity, over time. There has been an overall decrease in two local board areas between 2006 and 2018 – Ōtara-Papatoetoe and Manurewa.

Number of usual residents identifying with a European ethnic group, by local board (2006, 2013 and 2018)






Auckland's European population has a relatively older age structure

In 2018, 16.4% of Auckland's European population were aged 65 or older, compared to 7.0% of those identifying with other ethnicities. Between 2013 and 2018 there was a notable structural ageing effect, with a decrease in the proportions aged 0 to 19, and an increase in most other age groups except those aged 40 to 44.

Almost one in five (19.1%) of the European population was 0-14 years old, compared to 21.0% of other ethnicities. There had been a decrease in the proportions of European aged 0 to 4 years during that time.



At the 2018 Census, the median age of the European population in Auckland was 39.4 years, compared with 34.7 years overall in Auckland. European females (40.3 years) have a higher median age than European males (38.4 years).

A note on data sources

In response to issues with the 2018 Census, Stats NZ has, for the first time, used administrative and other data to help fill gaps caused by response rates that were lower than anticipated. More information on data sources used by variable is available on the Stats NZ website. Stats NZ rates the quality of ethnicity data as high.
